

Joliet, Illinois Community Profile Overnight Itinerary





Full of history, culture, shopping and great sporting activities, Joliet is the place where everyone can play! Start exploring with a visit to the Joliet Area Historical Museum, Route 66 Welcome Center, Rialto Square Theatre, Chicagoland Speedway & Route 66 Raceway, Autobahn Country Club, or attend a Joliet Slammers Baseball game. Try your luck at Harrah's Joliet and Hollywood Casinos or maybe a round of golf at one of Joliet's four beautiful golf courses. Visit the Splash Station Water Park or do some shopping at the Louis Joliet Mall.

The city's origins date back to 1833, but it wasn't until 1852 that it was incorporated officially as the city of Joliet. The origin of the name of the city is generally believed to be in part to honor explorer Louis Jolliet. It is the 3rd largest city in Illinois, with a population of 149,395 as of 2016.



Joliet is part of the original 1926 alignment of Route 66 in Illinois. The Joliet alignment (most of which is currently designated as IL 53) remained until it was bypassed in 1940 with a new alignment that ran through Plainfield. Portions of Route 66 in Joliet also parallel the I&M Canal (Illinois & Michigan Canal State Trail) and the Lincoln Highway. The portion of Route 66 traveling from Joliet to Wilmington was placed on to the National Register of Historic Places in 2006.

Collins Street Prison & Prison Park

Also known as the Joliet Correctional Center, the prison was built here in 1858 by prison labor. Its 25 foot high, 5 foot thick walls are made of pure Joliet limestone. It operated until 2002, having housed up to 1300 inmates. The classic prison architecture and atmosphere has been the set for several movies and television productions including The Blues Brothers. An exhibition at the Joliet Area Historical Museum interprets the prison.

Rich & Creamy

Rich & Creamy is typical of ice cream stores that dotted Route 66 in its heyday, when Broadway was a leg of the highway in Joliet. City leaders restored Rich & Creamy back to the retro appearance from its heyday. Jake and Elwood, The Blues Brothers, dance atop the tower wrapped in neon lights.

Chicagoland Speedway & Route 66 Raceway

Chicagoland Speedway is the largest sporting facility in the state of Illinois, this 1.5 mile D-shaped oval kicks-off the Chase for the NASCAR Sprint Cup along with hosting the NASCAR Nationwide Series, NASCAR Camping World Truck Series and the ARCA Racing Series. Consisting of a 1/4mile drag strip and a 1/2 mile dirt oval, Route 66 Raceway is a historic motorsports facility which annually hosts NHRA National Drag Racing events and Demolition Derbies.

Joliet Illinois Route 66 Experience Hub

Joliet is a crossroads of Route 66 and the Lincoln Highway, the first road to span the U.S. from coast to coast. Perched on the Des Plaines River, Joliet is a bustling hub where railroads, highways, and canals converge. The community drew people of many cultures to toil in the quarries, iron works, and roadways that built America. Today, you can get your "Kicks on 66" by exploring many Route 66 Attractions in town.

The "City of Steel" title sprang from the construction of the Joliet steel mill in 1869. At one time the second largest mill in America, it closed in 1932. It is now a county historic site. Limestone quarries earned Joliet the nickname "City of Stone." In 1858 the state built Joliet Prison, partly because of available stone for walls and cell houses. The 1871 Chicago Fire increased stone demand in Chicago and by 1890 Joliet was shipping three thousand railroad cars each month.

Joliet played a role in the 1980 movie classic The Blues Brothers, starring Dan Aykroyd and John Belushi. The adventure begins when "Joliet" Jake is released from the Joliet Prison. He is picked up by his brother Elwood, who was named for a community just south of here.
